Evaluation Coordinator (November 2019-December 2020) Funded by SAMHSA

Cooperative Agreements to Implement the National Strategy for Suicide Prevention (NSSP)

This study aims to evaluate the process and outcome of the development of a Zero Suicide Community System of Care utilizing the Zero Suicide Learning Collaborative that integrates hospitals, MH and SUD providers, community health centers, PCP practices, and suicide centers to collaboratively identify, assess, treat, and support recovery for adults at risk of suicide through transitions of care.

The Massachusetts (MA) Justice Community Opioid Innovation Network (JCOIN) Clinical Research Center

The study focuses on inmates with opioid use disorder (OUD) who receive no opioid treatment, and is designed to identify the contextual factors that facilitate and hinder the delivery of MOUDs (Medication for Opioid Use Disorder) in jail and community care coordination. The study also seeks to address the best practice strategies that optimize MOUD provision and linkage to community care.

The results also will inform EDs when, how, and for whom information needs to be provided for those testing again for HIV within one year, and the impact of these factors on HIV re-testing behavior within one year.

This study was in partnership between the Fundacao Oswaldo Cruz in Rio de Janeiro, Brasil, Partnerships in Prevention Science Institute at Iowa State University, and the Center for Health, Prevention, and Intervention at the University of Connecticut. The study was designed to systematically examine the effectiveness of oral HIV testing (OraSure) and an intervention designed to minimize mismessaging among drug users in Brazil, and allow our research team to use these findings to identify salient points to design culturally competent HIV and related health interventions for drug users, an acknowledge goal of the Brazilian Ministry of Health.

Migration, Alcohol Use and HIV Risk in Rural Mexico

The study focused on migration, wellbeing, problem drinking and HIV risk in a migrant sending community from where a significant number of Connecticut-based farm workers originate. The study explored norms, beliefs, and behaviors surrounding drinking comportment and HIV risk behaviors in a migrant-sending community in central Mexico; through interviews and participant observation it assessed the effects of out-migration on family and community well-being, particularly in terms of the ways in which these may contribute to problem drinking and HIV risk; and, it explored the effects of migration on workers who have returned to the community—whether temporarily or permanently—in terms of their beliefs, attitudes, and behaviors surrounding drinking and HIV risk behaviors.

Second-Hand Smoke (SHS) and Health Risk among Puerto Rican Children [Pilot Study]

Through the use of focus group discussion and in-depth interviews this pilot study aimed to, 1) gather formative qualitative data on SHS in a small sample of Puerto Ricans in Hartford, including key smoking and related terminology and indigenous concepts, the range of existing behavior patterns and practices regarding smoking around children, and community knowledge and attitude

about SHS; 2) use these qualitative findings to develop and interpret quantitative data collected through a pilot community survey of 120 Puerto Rican heads of household concerning life history of smoking, exposure to smoking during childhood, current individual and household smoking patterns, knowledge of SHS, attitudes about controlling children to SHS; and 3) use project findings to identify key issues for the development of a comprehensive multi-method RO1 study of Puerto Ricans and second-hand smoking.

This study was designed to provide critical formative information to be available for use in making policy decisions concerning Latina teen pregnancy intervention/programs needs, and in developing a federally funded multi-method proposal to quantitatively and qualitatively examine issues and needs in response to Latina teen pregnancy in Hartford Connecticut. The study used a range of proven qualitative methods, including focus groups, in-depth interviews, and street-intercept interviews. Compiled findings were presented in a manuscript report to the Connecticut Department of Public Health.

The population of the study included Mexican, Guatemalan, and Puerto Rican farm workers placed in the Connecticut River Valley.

Syringe Access and HIV Risk

This was a 3-site (Hartford, CT, New Haven, CT and Springfield, MA) research of drug user access to, use, and disposal of sterile syringes in light of contemporary understanding of AIDS risk and prevention with target population. The study built on prior contextual analyses to examine the impact of both neighborhood- and city-level contextual variables (e.g., presence of a syringe exchange program, type of syringe exchange, presence of a pharmacy that sells nonprescription syringes) on HIV-1 and hepatitis transmission risk behaviors among not-in-treatment injection drug users (a population known to have comparatively high rates of HIV/AIDS and a reservoir group for the spread of this disease to other population segments). The study used epidemiological, ethnographic, and bioassay methods to identify and compare a range of social and environmental factors in infectious disease risk.
